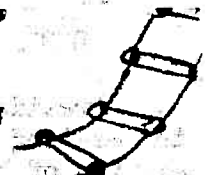

VHF SWEEPSTAKES

The weekend of January 3-4 will be NKARC's second venture in VHF contests in as many years. The club operated the June '75 contest from the QTH of K4JBV, using the club's call - K4CO. The results were good (check listing in QST), with over 200 contacts on 6 meter ssb.

The coming event will be the first contest operated from the club trailer. Six and two meters will be used - with the recently installed "Big Stick" antenna being used on two meters. "Big Stick" is the nickname given the Hustler omni-directional gain antenna on top of the water tower. It's fed with 7/8 inch heliax feedline.

The communications manager, K4MEE, is organizing the event. Operators will include: WA4RUQ, WA4DQY, WB8HYP, WA4NKD, WB4FAT, K4MEE, and a few others. If you're interested in operating or observing, contact K4MEE at 331-2208. Or just stop by the club trailer on the weekend.

CODE AND THEORY CLASSES?

Is there enough interest in northern Ky. to start a license study course? That was a topic discussed at the Dec. 2 club meeting.

The discussion was barely underway and we already had: 1) one member volunteer the use of a school classroom; 2) another volunteer the use of a code machine and instructor time. Other suggestions for the classes quickly followed. And some questions were asked: should we teach novice classes only? how would we publicize the classes to non-hams? should a fee be charged, and maybe include a key, oscillator, and study guide?

The classes might meet one evening a week, with each club member taking a turn at instructing. DO YOU KNOW ANYONE INTERESTED IN TAKING SUCH A CLASS? Ask your friends, and get word back to us.

SIMULATED EMERGENCY TEST

The annual S.E.T. will be January 24-25, with club activities planned for Sunday (25th). The SET is a drill designed to test the amateur radio operators' ability to respond to emergency type situations.

All amateurs are invited to participate in the club activity by checking into the net (K4CO net control) on 146.58 mhz anytime during the Sunday drill. The event will include originating and passing messages, such as informing the ARRL SEC that (your call) is participating in the SET. A sample message format is given below:

DECEMBER MEETING (DEC. 2, 1975)

President Bob Pentz, K4DMA, called the meeting to order at 8:10 p.m. The minutes of both the previous meeting and the officers' meeting were read. The treasurers' report was then given.

Charles Sweet III, K4MEE, reported that the heliack was installed for the two meter antenna. Coax was installed for the tribander - it works great!

Bill Martin, K4JBV, reported on the coverage with the two meter antenna.

Harold Blocher, WB4VOA, reported that the Motorola rig purchased by the club should be shipped by Dec. 30. Work is still being done on the rig he donated for use at the Red Cross building (Cincinnati).

K4JBV made a proposal to install the repeater (belonging to No. Ky. Repeater Assn.) at the club trailer on a permanent basis. The repeater would use its own antenna, and be shut down during club activities if interference arises from its operation. The repeater could be used for a burglar alarm, and would also provide a phone at the trailer when auto-patch is again provided. The cost of electric would be shared by the club and repeater. All expenses of the repeater group will be kept separate from the club.

WB4HDW made the above proposal a motion; WA4KUB seconded it and the motion carried.

WB4VOA obtained a power transfer switch for the club trailer (for switching in the generator).

A working party was scheduled to finish some work at trailer. The time is Saturday (Dec. 6) at 10 a.m.

The nominating committee presented the candidates for office for the coming year. Elections followed (results in this newsletter). Standing committees will be appointed at the January meeting.

All present officers were commended for their accomplishments while in office. GOOD JOB!

A discussion was started on the possibility of starting code and theory classes.

The meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

HOLES IN THE IONOSPHERE TO AID RADIO ASTRONOMY

The exhausts from large space rockets make holes in the ionosphere. The release of large quantities of gas mops up free electrons and so reduces ionization. The Spacelab launch made an ionosphere hole which persisted for several hours.

A suggestion has been made that such a hole, in the right place, would permit radio astronomy at frequencies which normally do not reach the earth. (Reprint from Wireless World, Sept. 1975)
